From the Language Acquisition Department

We, at the Language Acquisition Department, continue to work enthusiastically with our students to offer them effective and joyful learning experiences of the target language (Korean and Spanish). In this edition of our ISB newsletter, we highlight some of the most relevant activities that we have been doing.

Korean (B) - Grades 8-12

October 9 was 한글날 (Hangeul Day). Hangeul Day is a national holiday in South Korea that commemorates the Korean Alphabet every October 9th. We celebrate the day when the Korean writing system, 'Hangeul' was created by 세종대왕 (King Sejong) in 1443. It is also known as "Hangeul Proclamation Day."

In ISB, the Korean Language (B) language acquisition students had time to appreciate the beauty and nature of the Korean alphabet system, Hangeul, by expressing their creative ideas with Hangeul consonants and vowels. ISB Korean students really enjoyed the time with Hangeul.



Korean (B) - grades G - 7

Grade 6 and 7 Korean B students are currently exploring the unit on 'Eating with the family.' In this unit, students learned how to order food politely in Korean and introduce Korean food and customs. As part of exploring Korean culture, students made 송편 (Songpyeon), a traditional rice cake prepared during Chuseok, and learned the cultural significance of making and sharing them with family. To practice their language skills in a real-world setting, we visited a café located in front of the school. Each student read the menu and ordered their chosen items in Korean, applying what they had learned in class. It was a fun and rewarding experience, as the students had the chance to use the language outside the classroom in an authentic environment. Everyone enjoyed the activity and gained confidence in their speaking skills.













Spanish (B) - Grade 6

¡Aprendiendo con energía! (Learning with energy!)

So far this year, our Grade 6 Spanish language acquisition class has been buzzing with enthusiasm and excitement as students dive into the vibrant world of Spanish language learning! From greetings to verb conjugation, and giving presentations about themselves and their families, these lively learners are making remarkable progress.








Students have been playing revision games on platforms like Señor Wooley, Blooket and Quizlet, where they can reinforce their vocabulary and grammar skills while having fun with their classmates. One of the highlights was an exciting scavenger hunt that had students racing around the school, practising their Spanish skills while solving clues. They searched for items and completed tasks that required them to use the vocabulary and phrases they'd been learning. It was a fantastic way to get everyone moving and apply their knowledge in a practical setting.

Spanish (B) - Grade 11

In the picture, Grade 11 DP Spanish B/SL students are focused as they complete their writing and reading comprehension summative assessments. These tasks are part of their unit on "Identities," specifically exploring health and lifestyle. The summative assessments evaluate the student's understanding of vocabulary, grammar, and cultural concepts related to the unit. Summative tasks in the DP language acquisition program are crucial as they measure students' language proficiency, encourage the use of complex structures, and ensure they apply their knowledge in meaningful contexts. These assessments also

prepare them for future real-world situations and the final IB exams in grade 12.

Spanish (B) - Grade 10

In the picture, Grade 10 MYP Spanish B students are working together on a project related to their unit on "Going on Vacation." They are discussing travel plans, looking at maps, and sharing ideas about destinations. Collaborative tasks like this foster communication skills as students practise speaking and listening in Spanish while engaging with real-world scenarios. Developing collaborative skills in a language acquisition class is essential in the MYP because it helps students learn from one another, enhances problem-solving abilities, and builds confidence in using the language. Through



teamwork, they not only learn but also enjoy the process, making language learning more dynamic and engaging.

Spanish (B) - Grade 8

In the picture, Grade 8 MYP Spanish B students are actively participating in a vocabulary feedback session with their teacher as part of their unit on "Health and Well-being." They are using their smartphones to look up words, take notes, and engage with interactive language apps. Group-teacher formative feedback sessions are essential in Spanish language acquisition



classes, as they allow students to clarify misunderstandings, receive personalized guidance, and improve their language skills in a supportive environment. These sessions foster active learning and collaboration, making the process more enjoyable. Incorporating technology, like smartphones, enhances language learning by offering quick access to resources and interactive tools, making learning more dynamic and effective.
