How Do Math and Language Develop in EY2?

In EY2, children take ownership of their learning by choosing activities throughout the day. This child-led approach fosters meaningful connections to our unit











of inquiry while naturally integrating both foundational and complex concepts in math and language. For example, math skills develop as children count to 20 during games, gather materials for crafting, or explore shapes through play. Language skills are nurtured in purposeful contexts, such as writing messages on cards for friends and family, and sharing ideas both non-verbally and verbally. In these contexts, children learn about letters, words, and communication in a meaningful way.

The teachers' role extends beyond observation. As facilitators and documenters, they provide strategies, guide connections to broader concepts, and ensure children's play is both purposeful and enriching. This balanced approach supports deeper learning that aligns with the children's interests.

Reggie shared, "If we learn the letters, then we know what people say in the book." Nathalie added, "So the numbers help us understand how many we need."


Grade 9 - Product Design Creating 'new' from 'old' - 'UpCycling **Wood Palettes'**

This was the main idea for our Grade 9s (all the while gaining valuable Design process thinking, and workshop skills for




wood-working, etc.) this Semester. They've created some truly innovative and worthwhile products - we hope they will be taken home or given to their clients and cherished for many years to come.











Grade 12 - Testing IA Prototypes

Positive News!

Dear ISB Community,

Some time back, I shared an article from Common Sense Media Explaining the News to Our Kids that—given the status of world affairs—continues to be relevant and helpful. News about war and acts of violence are very much a part of our day. These issues are important and deserve our attention, however, it is crucial, especially now, to remind ourselves and our loved ones that there are many positive things going on in the world right now, every day. It is not only war and conflict.

This is a message that is particularly important for our children who might be struggling with the heavy influx of charged information either through their devices or from conversations with those around them. Intentionally focusing on finding and reading/listening to positive news can help provide a more balanced view of the world, one that is not only fed by the mainstream news media—which tend to lean toward negative narratives—but by a wider array of sources and voices. Intentionally seeking good news



does not necessarily come naturally to us humans as we are evolutionarily wired to identify threats around us. For more on this topic, see the article <u>The Neuroscience of Good and Bad News</u> by Dr. Rick Hanson. It is not always easy to know where to find reliable sources of information for positive news.

Thankfully, there are professional journalists as well as members of the general public who dedicate themselves to reporting positive initiatives and uplifting stories from around the world, of people, communities, and organizations who are working hard to make the world a better place. Some resources you may wish to explore, for yourself as well as to share with your loved ones, are the Positive News website (UK based, high-quality journalism around positive news around the world), Good News Network, and Reasons To Be Cheerful.

Eco Initiatives at ISB

Interview with ISB IT Team: Tackling E-Waste Sustainably

For this week's Eco Club Newsletter, we had the opportunity to interview Mr. Plotzki about how the IT team manages its electronic waste responsibly.



Q: How does the IT team ensure old electronics are reused or recycled responsibly?

Mr. Plotzki: We use a renewal schedule and a cataloging system to track all electronics on campus. Our priority is reuse; we sell functional devices to teachers at a good price, extending their life by up to five years. Non-functional devices are sold to a licensed e-waste recycler in Busan, who crushes, separates, and refines the parts for reuse.


Q: How do you select a reputable e-waste recycler and what is the auditing process?

Mr. Plotzki: We ensure recyclers have a government-issued license and maintain clear records of what is sent

and how it is disposed of. We trust the Korean government's certification process for environmental compliance.

Q: What impact has reusing and recycling electronics had on ISB's environmental efforts?

Mr. Plotzki: We've significantly reduced electronic waste in landfills. Old devices are repurposed, such as powering digital displays. We measure the weight of diverted e-waste and track our carbon footprint, including data usage and building energy.



Q: Are there any upcoming plans to further reduce e-waste at ISB?

Mr. Plotzki: Our focus is on educational support, but we plan to standardize systems to prevent quick obsolescence. We're considering offering e-waste recycling services for students and families, with fees reinvested into eco-initiatives.



We thank Mr. Plotzki for sharing these insights and inspiring us to think creatively about reducing e-waste. We are also sincerely grateful to our IT team for their incredible efforts in supporting sustainability initiatives.
