## Digital Citizenship Week at ISB

What a wonderful week of learning we have had here at ISB as the entire school focused-in on what it means to be *safe, responsible and respectful* when using technology for learning.

During Digital Citizenship Week at ISB, secondary students explored how to use AI in an academically honest way. They debated questions like: Is it okay to use AI for outlining an essay or revising it? Can AI help find quotes or translate into another language? These discussions aimed to align students' understanding with our curricular programs.

In elementary school, students learned about being safe, responsible, and respectful with technology through stories and thinking routines. They pledged to practise good digital citizenship and signed a poster displayed outside the tech office. Students also entered a sticker competition showing how Taeguk, our mascot, can spread kindness online.



We also engaged with parents through a viewing of **Screenagers: Elementary School Edition**, followed by a roundtable discussion on the challenges and solutions around children's digital lives.



# Early Years 2: How We Express Ourselves Inquiry Focus: Box Exploration

The box journey continues in EY2! The children remain deeply engaged in exploring boxes and love sharing their creative ideas with each other. As part of this exploration, they are learning how to use a variety of tools, focusing on the appropriate techniques for working with different materials, and most importantly, how to use these tools safely.

Through imaginative design, the children are discovering how different shapes, sizes, and types of boxes can be transformed into something new. They are demonstrating risk-taking by using staplers, scissors, and child-friendly cutters, all under careful supervision. What stands out the most in this inquiry is the growing confidence among the children. They are expressing their ideas through box creations, using a range of tools, sharing materials with peers, and supporting each other in tidying up.

This exploration is closely linked to our current unit, How We Express Ourselves, with the central idea: *Through play, people share their ideas and feelings.* 



### **Early Years 1: How We Express Ourselves**

We started our new unit on "How We Express Ourselves" by reading Not a Box by Antoinette Portis. This engaging story was used to help the children understand that a simple cardboard box can transform into anything they can imagine.



After the story, we divided the class into two groups, each with cardboard boxes, and encouraged the children to turn their boxes into something fun and creative. One group decided to make a fire engine, while the other began working on their own imaginative projects. During this activity, we introduced the word "idea."

Throughout the unit, we will explore the concept of "idea" and encourage the children to share their thoughts while playing.

Our goal is for the children to understand that they can express their thoughts and feelings through their imagination and by bringing their ideas to life.

# From the English Language and Literature department Grade 6 English

In Grade 6 English, we've just wrapped up our first MYP English Language and Literature unit, titled 'Legends and Lore: Exploring the Power of Myths.' The students seemed to enjoy diving into classic myths and legends, as well as researching fascinating tales from their own homelands. As a culmination of their hard work, each student created their own myth, complete with all the conventions of mythological writing — which I'm sure they'll be delighted to share with their parents if asked! As an end-of-unit review, we hosted an Escape Room challenge in the secondary library. I'm thrilled to report that our brave Grade 6 warriors successfully escaped




by working together to solve four tricky, myth-themed puzzles! This activity was not only highly engaging but also a great way for them to showcase and develop their knowledge, communication, and teamwork skills.



#### Grade 6 Korean

In grade 6 Korean, students embarked on their first unit of middle school by learning about various types of writing. They focused on the structure and characteristics of expository texts, gaining the opportunity to write their own pieces. Each student selected a topic and practiced writing by choosing appropriate explanatory methods and organizing their work according to the established structure. This hands-on experience has helped them develop essential writing skills for their academic journey.

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#### Grade 7 English

The 7th-grade English students are wrapping up their unit on Dystopian Literature by writing original short stories! They're exploring the Sustainable Development Goals to generate ideas and are learning creative writing techniques to enhance their storytelling. The unit focuses on the ATL skill of generating new ideas and considering new perspectives, and the activities reflect this focus. One popular activity was "Detail and Imagery Bingo," which encouraged students to engage their five senses to inspire their writing. The overall aim of this project is for students to understand the importance of sustainability and how today's choices impact our future.





### Grade 8 English

Our Grade 8 English students have just wrapped up a journey of discovery through Flowers for Algernon by Daniel Keyes and The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time by Mark Haddon. Both books took students deep into the lives of two very different characters, Charlie and Christopher, as they faced challenges that changed their lives and the way they saw the world.

Throughout the unit, students worked hard to analyse how these personal discoveries affected the characters' sense of self and their relationships with others.

With class discussions, close reading, and some great comparisons between the two stories, we explored big ideas about intelligence, perception, and what it means to be an empathetic human. It was inspiring to see students reflect on how their own experiences and backgrounds shape the way they view the world around them!

#### Grade 8 Korean

In 8th grade Korean, students engaged in writing autobiographies after learning various expressions and techniques for impactful introductions. They introduced their friends through video presentations, showcasing their unique stories.

Additionally, students reflected on their past experiences and recorded significant events in their lives as part of their autobiographical writing. This project allowed them to not only enhance their writing skills but also deepen their self-awareness and connection with peers.







# Grade 9 English

Grade 9 English has just finished up a fascinating unit on belonging—a theme that really hit home for many of our students. Through *The House on Mango Street* by Sandra Cisneros, we follow the main character Esperanza as she grows up and discovers who she is, with her name, her house, and her cultural roots all playing important roles in shaping her identity.

In class, students explored these ideas through analytical activities and got creative by writing their own vignettes about belonging. The personal connections they made were so impressive, and it was wonderful to see how Esperanza's story helped them reflect on their own sense of identity and the communities they are a part of. The unit ended with some thoughtful discussions within a Socratic seminar setting about finding our place in the world.



# Grade 10 English

Grade 10 English students have been taking a deep dive into the world of comparative analysis in our opening unit titled 'Narrative Connections'. Our students underwent a thought-provoking and enlightening process of exploring a diverse range of texts - from acclaimed short stories to lesser-known flash fiction and provocative video advertisements.



This journey equipped them with valuable tools for critical analysis and interpretation. Recently, they've been immersed in researching, writing, and rehearsing for a comparative analysis of two texts of their choice - pairing a short story with a video advertisement. While public speaking can be daunting, especially in front of peers, I'm truly impressed by the depth of research, insightful connections, and confident delivery demonstrated in these presentations. It's been rewarding to see our students apply their analytical skills across different media and grow as communicators.

## Grade 11 English

The grade 11 English Language and Literature class has begun the year exploring the lyrics of American songwriter Bob Dylan. Students have been learning about the contextual issues that Dylan addresses while also looking at how the songs can be universally understood as dealing with broader global issues of equity, equality, and justice. In tandem with this, students have also been exploring how non-literary text types deal with similar issues, exploring political cartoons, comics, and photo collage work. This week students wrote their first summative assessment, analyzing an unseen comic strip considering how the visual and textual elements work together to create a message for readers.

#### Grade 11 Korean

In Grade 11 Korean Language and Literature, students have been studying and researching the collection of works by Lee Beom-seon as part of the first piece in the DP program. Through in-depth understanding and analysis, students have engaged in interpreting and

evaluating the texts, fostering their appreciation for literature. This process has also prepared them for upcoming exams, ensuring they are well-equipped to demonstrate their knowledge and skills.



#### Grade 12 English

The grade 12 English Language and Literature students have just finished their first IB assessment in the course. This challenging oral assessment involves students sharing an analysis for 10 minutes followed by 5 minutes of answering questions. The students analyzed a variety of texts including memoirs, graphic novels, film and political cartoons. With that major task behind them, they are now starting their study of the novel The Reluctant Fundamentalist by Mohsin Hamid.
